

TA Peer Observation Guide

You can become more aware of details that work in a classroom when you adopt the role of an observer. Use this template to keep a running log of what's happening, take notes on the classroom environment, and jot down any questions/comments for follow-up.

SESSION LOG	CLASSROOM ENVIRONMENT
 Keep a log of what is happening in the session. In particular, note: What is the TA doing? What are the students doing? Example: 0:00 TA starts class, hands back papers 0:05 TA announces small group activity, explains task, writes instructions on board. 0:08 Students break up into groups, one student not following instructions, TA asked student if he wanted to join in, student then complied. 	Observe how the classroom environment (the physical set-up, the social and emotional space) supports learning. Start noting these things as soon as you enter the room: Room adequate for needs of class? (seating, technology, board space, lighting, etc.) Tables/chairs arranged well for each activity? Students seem comfortable and relaxed? TA chatting and friendly? Number of students present?

	Note things that stood out to you for later follow-up with the TA you are observing: Types of things to notice: Time spent by students on active vs. passive tasks (e.g. writing vs. listening) Explanations of plan for the day (agenda posted/announced? relevance of activities explained? expectations explicit?) TA talk time vs. student talk time (does TA dominate? do all students talk? for how long?) Accountability (does TA follow through on things students have been asked to do?) Engagement of students (paying attention? Texting?) Time management of class Use of board/technology? TA movement (front only? roaming?)
