Course description and prerequisites

The syllabus for M408C includes most of the basic topics in the theory of functions of a real variable: Algebraic, trigonometric, logarithmic and exponential functions and their limits, continuity, derivatives, maxima and minima, integration, area under a curve, and volumes of revolution.

Syllabus

Textbook: Stewart Calculus, Early Transcendentals, Seventh Edition.

It is available at the University Co-op for about 99 USD, including eBook access.

It is your responsibility to keep track of any changes as the semester progresses. **Participation at lectures and TA sessions is required.** There will be random attendance checks.

Homework

To submit, you must enter your answers in Quest. The usual format will be multiple choice. Quest will immediately tell you if your answer is correct or not.

You are allowed multiple tries, but there will be a reduction of points after each unsuccessful attempt. There will be absolutely no acceptance of any late submissions. The deadlines posted on Quest are definite, and sharp to the minute. Usually, the homework will be due at 11:59 PM (one minute before midnight) on Wednesdays.
